

### Query for February: Caring for One Another and Listening

**How can we most effectively foster a loving and understanding attitude in our community? What helps me to listen deeply and with an open heart to others? When is it hardest for me to be ready to listen? How do we share in the diverse joys and transitions in each other's lives? In challenging or stressful times, how open am I to seeking support from the Meeting community?**

### **The Social Concerns Box**

The February Social Concerns Box is for hunger relief programs in Montgomery County (provided by Bethesda Help, Bethesda Cares, the Manna Food Center, and Shepherd's Table).

Hunger in our community comes in many forms and is probably more widespread than most of us realize. (One in four residents of Montgomery County faces food insecurity.) The February Social Concerns Box is for four hunger relief programs. BFM has the longest association with Bethesda Help ([www.bethesdahelp.org](http://www.bethesdahelp.org)) It provides emergency food boxes, financial assistance for rent and utilities, transportation to medical and other appointments, and referrals for neighbors in crisis. Manna Food Center ([www.mannafood.org](http://www.mannafood.org)) provides nutritious food to 3,600 families and thousands of school children each month. Bethesda Cares ([www.bethesdacares.org](http://www.bethesdacares.org)) and Shepherd's Table ([www.shepherdstable.org](http://www.shepherdstable.org)) serve the homeless (in Bethesda and Silver Spring respectively). Please support the range of efforts to make our County hunger-free.

In December, we raised \$337 through the Social Concerns Box for A Wider Circle. And the final total in November for Action in Montgomery was \$321.

### **12th: Sidwell Friends School Black Student Union Production**

Please consider attending the Sidwell Friends School annual Black Student Union Black History Month production on Friday, February 12, at 7:00 p.m, at the Kogod Arts Center Theater on the upper school campus. The BSU production has a long and rich history that spans two decades and includes participants from all three divisions (children from Pre-K through grade 12). Upper School faculty advisors Hayes Davis and Susannah Parker will guide the production along with production director Pilar Lynch. Many BFM members have participated in the performance in the past and several junior members of BFM will be participating in this year's show. This year's show will continue addressing police brutality, the killing of black people by police officers, and the general lack of indictments following those deaths. It will also address the ways in which race factors into the experiences of many black students (and other students of color) in the Sidwell Friends School community.

### **Religious Education**

Rosa Greenberg led a lively discussion with BFM children and parents last month on the role of labor unions in promoting improved work conditions, wages, and social justice. Rosa, who grew up in the BFM community, graduated from Pomona College, and moved to Boston where she is an organizer for Local 26 UniteHere union. She posed questions and wrote the children's answers on a white board listing workers' needs. She illustrated company owners as big fish and workers as little fish. The children learned that when workers unite to press their demands owners are more likely to respond positively. Also they learned how a labor organizer helps workers determine what they want from management and how to go about achieving it. The hour ended with crafting a colorful art presentation of the role of unions, now posted on the library wall.

## **Meeting Notes**

### **Peace Notes**

Let us enter into this election year inspired by love and not fear. President Obama closed his final State of the Union address with the following encouragement, which beautifully echoed that sentiment:

“Our brand of democracy is hard. But I can promise that a year from now, when I no longer hold this office, I'll be right there with you as a citizen —inspired by those voices of fairness and vision, of grit and good humor and kindness that have helped America travel so far. Voices that help us see ourselves not first and foremost as black or white or Asian or Latino, not as gay or straight, immigrant or native born; not as Democrats or Republicans, but as Americans first, bound by a common creed. Voices Dr. King believed would have the final word—voices of unarmed truth and unconditional love.

They're out there, those voices. They don't get a lot of attention, nor do they seek it, but they are busy doing the work this country needs doing. . . .

That's the America I know. That's the country we love. Clear-eyed. Big-hearted. Optimistic that unarmed truth and unconditional love will have the final word. That's what makes me so hopeful about our future.”

### **William Penn House**

William Penn House is a hospitality center on Capitol Hill grounded in Quaker faith, which many of us have enjoyed for potlucks, fellowship with Quakers in this area, workshops, and workcamps. WPH provides a place to stay, worship, and organize. Byron Sandford retired as Executive Director after 16 years and Andrei Israel has been selected as his replacement. Many of us know Andrei from his visits to BFM and his involvement in many Quaker activities in the area. He is completing his PhD and is moving to DC with his wife for this position.

### **Thinking About Race**

Research “shows subconscious connections in people's minds between black faces and crime, and how those links may pervert justice; law enforcement officers across the country are

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taking note.” “A Hard Look at How We See Race” describes research by Jennifer Eberhardt, PhD, a professor at Stanford University (and an African-American), reactions to it, and its impact on providing training within law enforcement. Lorie Fridell, who was head of research for a law enforcement policy group in Washington, D.C., stated: “Key to the training’s appeal is that it treats bias as a common human condition to be recognized and managed, rather than as a deeply offensive personal sin, an approach that makes cops less defensive. ‘They understand that it is a real issue with which they need to deal, but not because the profession is made up of ill-intentioned individuals with explicit biases (e.g., racists), but because the profession is comprised of humans.’” From “A Hard Look at How We See Race,” by Sam Scott, published in *Utne Reader*, Winter 2015.
